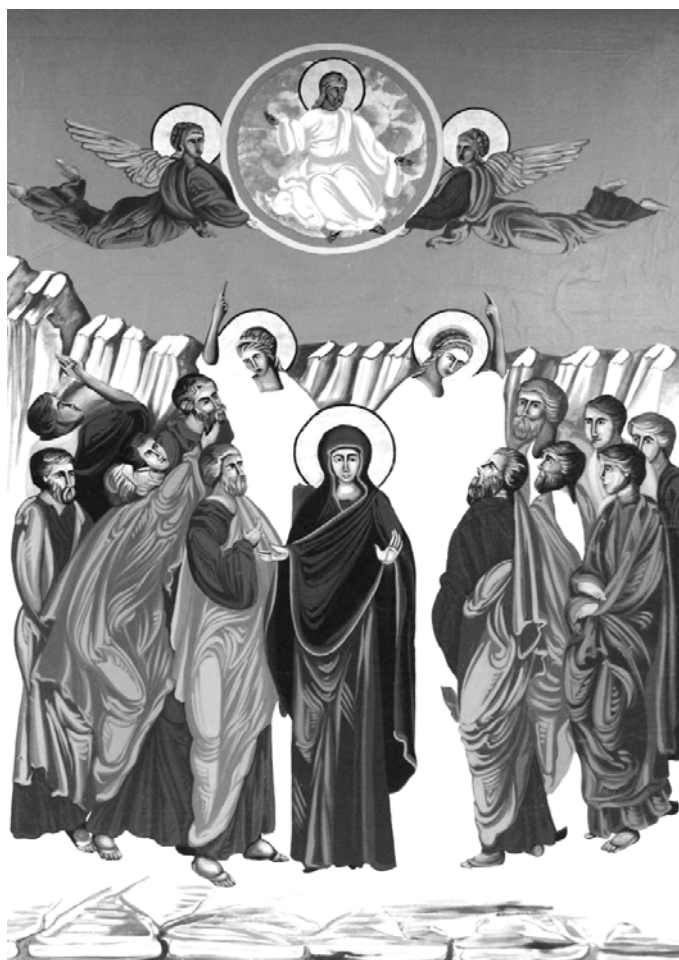

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January, 489/644; February, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621; November 622. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1,525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1,653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7,094 Catholics.



Treasures from Tradition

In Ireland and the United Kingdom, Mother's Day is over. "Mothering Sunday" was on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Long ago, people were freed from work to travel on this day to the parish where they were baptized, their "Mother Church." Often, people were reunited with their mothers on this day. Employers would release their workers and servants for this visit. The American celebration, while based on this custom, really has to do with an anti-war movement of mothers in Civil War times. They crusaded for better sanitary conditions for their sons. When President Wilson instituted the first Mother's Day in 1912, it was a day to fly the flag in honor of mothers whose children had died in battle. Knowing the tradition is a good balance to our celebration today. We can enfold in prayer the mothers who have suffered the loss of their children in war. — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Muchos países Latinoamericanos celebran esta fiesta. En un continente donde la agricultura es tan importante no hay que sorprenderse de la importancia de este santo español del siglo XII. Además san Isidro se parece a mucha gente de Latinoamérica: es de padres campesinos, de familia pobre y religiosa, no fue a la escuela, quedó huérfano y se empleó como peón de campo, ayudando en la agricultura.

Se casó con María la cual también llegó a ser santa. Tuvieron un hijo. Los tres fueron reconocidos como piadosos y generosos. Gracias a Dios, la santidad se encuentra en todo tipo de persona. Los casados y padres y madres de familia también llegan a ser santos. Después de su muerte en 1130 se descubrió que su cuerpo estaba milagrosamente incorrupto. Witnesses to the Living Word

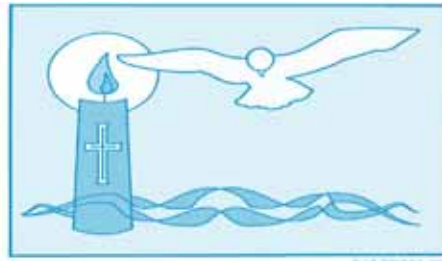
Every year on the Solemnity of the Nativity when we celebrate the Incarnation, we hear this passage proclaimed at the Mass during the Day:

In the beginning was the Word,
and the Word was with God,
and the Word was God. ...
And the Word became flesh
and made his dwelling among us.
(John 1:1, 14a)

Now, as we near the end of the Easter season, the Word is preparing to return to God. In the Gospel, Jesus gives us two guideposts for living life in Christ after his return to the Father. The first tells us who we are not, and the second who we are.

Jesus says of his disciples: “They do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world.” What does Jesus mean? Don’t we, as Catholic Christians, believe that creation is good and a direct revelation of the Creator?

In Psalm 50, God says: “Mine is the world and all that fills it” (v12), and far from spurning his creation, John’s Gospel affirms that Jesus’ very presence among us is a sign of God’s great love for the world (3:16). And yet, despite the goodness of creation, and the tender care God lavishes upon it, we do not belong to the world. The vastness and beauty that we find within the world is only a shadow of the beauty and vastness of the Creator and one would make a poor substitute for the other.



As Christians, we do not belong to the world, but to the Word that came to dwell among us. And this living Word calls us into service to bear its life-giving power and transforming joy to others.

As children of the infinite Divine, we cannot belong to that which is finite. Possessions, pleasures and even human relationships are unable to satisfy the deepest longings of our souls. And so, Jesus shows us another way. He prays, “Consecrate them in the truth. Your word is truth.” To consecrate is to sanctify, make holy or to set aside for a sacred purpose. It is also the action that takes place at our altar every time the Mass is celebrated, when bread and wine are set aside for a holy purpose, and then transformed through the power of the Holy Spirit into the body and blood of Jesus.

As Christians, we do not belong to the world, but to the Word that came to dwell among us. And this living Word calls us into service to bear its life-giving power and transforming joy to others.

In the first reading, the apostles must find a replacement

for Judas Iscariot. The only prerequisite for this new apostle is that he be one who “accompanied us the whole time the Lord Jesus came and went among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day on which he was taken up from us” (Acts 1:21-22). One can only witness to what one knows. One can only belong to what one is devoted to.

John’s Gospel tells us of the time when the Word took on flesh and, in so doing, revealed to us “his glory ... full of grace and truth” (1:14). We live two millennia away from this time when to follow Jesus meant to walk along the dusty roads of Israel, and to touch Jesus was to reach out for the hem of his cloak.

Yet, the Word still dwells among us. We hear the Word in the sacred Scriptures, we see Jesus in the faces of the people who share our lives, and we touch the risen Christ in the bread and wine of the Eucharist.

Speaking to another group of disciples who loved Jesus without experiencing his earthly life in Israel, St. Paul exhorts the Colossians: “Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly” (3:16a). This is the one to whom we belong.
