



(7/1/2016-6/30/2017




* Our budget for Fiscal 2017 was \$584,000, we surpassed our budgeted collections by \$7,400!

The remaining \$.25 of Parish expenses are covered by our fundraisers. Our operating expenses include salaries, utilities, health insurance, archdiocese assessments.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses; The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January, 489/644; February, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705; May, 573; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621; November 622. In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7094 Catholics.





Treasures from Tradition

The disciples gathered on the fiftieth day after the Resurrection were not keeping their first Pentecost.

For them, Pentecost was the fiftieth day after Passover, a feast of the first fruits of the harvest.

Today, Jews gather on the eve of the feast to study scripture and the law, and after the feast begins at sundown, spend the day in joyful social gatherings. The meaning of the celebration is the giving of the law on Mount Sinai, so for Christians the connection to the gifts of the Holy Spirit is obvious. In Sicily and in the Pantheon in Rome, today the descent of the Holy Spirit is enacted with a stunning ritual. Some churches there have an "eye" in the roof open to the sky, called an *oculus*. After the Gospel today, thousands of rose petals fall from the *oculus* onto the assembly. Churches and homes are decked in greenery and flowers to express the new life the Holy Spirit brings on this, the "birthday of the church." — Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

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To What Is The Spirit Calling Us?

We use many different languages to try to communicate with each other. *Ethnologue*, the catalogue of world languages, currently lists 6,909 living languages, yet experts tell us that our nonverbal body language conveys 93 percent of our message. In addition, there are books with titles such as, *The Five Love Languages* or *The Language of the Heart*. Even our computer programs are written in different languages.

Even with this wide array of language tools, we still struggle to really connect with each other in a world too often deeply divided by politics, religion, race, gender, etc. Our souls are hungry for a Spirit that can unite us on common ground and inspire us to work together for the common good. Instinctively, we know that together we are more. What does the Spirit of that first Christian Pentecost have to teach us about reaching across communication barriers to become the one body of Christ?

Before the Pentecost experience, for very good reasons, Jesus' disciples were imprisoned by fear. While fear can alert us to real danger, living in fear can paralyze us. Diplomatic harmony seldom begins from a defensive, anxious stance. Being filled with the Holy Spirit freed the disciples to fearlessly proclaim a message in which hope could be translated into any language. Likewise, an important first step toward unity is examining whether we are conveying suspicion or assurance in our exchanges.

Jesus' disciples had every right to be angry about his false conviction and tortuous murder. It was categorically unethical, immoral and unjust. However, when faced with the choice of perpetuating the cycle of violence through revenge, the Spirit stirred them to be messengers of Christ's peace instead. In that Spirit, people gathered together around them to live a new life-giving and nonviolent way of life. In the face of today's divisiveness, can we ask ourselves which has the greatest potential for inspiring fruitful community action — righteous indignation or constructive dialogue?

In the Jewish society at the time of Jesus, rank and position were strictly defined as a matter of honor. Even though Jesus' disciples had very little status, they spoke with an authority on that Pentecost. That got everyone's attention. Their authority did not come from searching out likeminded people and then demeaning those with differing values. They did

not pass judgment on who was worthy or belittle those with conflicting perspectives. Respectfully accepting people as they were, the disciples let the message speak for itself, and because of their tolerance it could be heard across communication gaps. In our search for justice, have we confused values we hold sacred by pitting them against each other? How do we dig out from our inflammatory entrenchments to make room for richer and more holistic solutions through consensus?

What is the Spirit calling us to in response to an environment of growing fear that paralyzes, anger that demeans and intolerance that isolates us? When we are willing to share our gifts rather than hoarding them in fear; to celebrate each other rather than competing for prestige; and to build bridges of understanding rather than needing to have the last word, then we are learning to speak the Spirit's language of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. Speaking with one voice the Spirit's voice, together we can create more light for our darkness, more courage for our fear, more hope for our despair, more wisdom for our confusion, more love for our hate, and more peace for our turmoil. When we communicate together on common ground, we can do more for the common good. Together we are more.


