Update from Fr. Frank



I recently preached on "maintenance vs mission." Maintenance is the death of the Holy Spirit. It sti esthe Spirit's ability to help us to GROW! We have to be willing to dive down under the surface - to go deeper. We have to be willing to enter into mission mode.

There is often talk of maintaining our Sunday collections over the summer season, so that we can maintain our buildings, our ministries, our community. Forget maintaining. We are a missionary parish and Jesus didn't take summers off. We can do better than maintain

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.

Treasures From Tradition

It's midsummer day! We have the advantage of celebrating one of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar on a Sunday this year. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and today's birth of the Baptist. Today's date is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25) when Mary

by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are exactly half a year away from Christmas Eve. There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration. Just as at Christmas, a religious festival spills over into culture. As summer light reaches its peak, the sun-drenched zones of northern Europe see people staying up all night, lighting "St. John's fires" in the long summer twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in

twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in all these celebrations, kindled along the shores of the St. Lawrence in Quebec and Montreal, with harbor illuminations in France. You may be most interested in the custom in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Baptist's own city. People there will leap into the sea between midnight and dawn to honor John. Why not find your way to a pool, a lake, or a sandy beach today and plunge in to recall your baptism? It's a tradition!

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Hoy recordamos a san Juan Bautista, primo de Jesucristo y precursor del Mesías. Juan se hizo famoso predicando la penitencia y bautizando con agua, insistiendo que vendría uno que bautizaría al mundo con fuego y el Espíritu Santo. Hoy es uno de los santos mas festejados en el mundo,

especialmente en zonas donde su fiesta coincidía con la llegada del verano.

Para celebrar a este santo pariente de Jesús la gente en Alicante, España, hace fogatas durante la noche de su vigilia y baila en torno a ellas. En América el pueblo Boliviano también recibe al santo con hogueras, para quemar la tierra en busca de fertilidad y purificación. Los Bolivianos también festejan echándose agua los unos a los otros.

San Juan ha sido honrado en el hemisferio Americano desde 1509 cuando Juan Ponce de León nombró la Isla de Puerto Rico en su honor. También allí hacen el juego del agua en la fiesta de san Juan ya que los fieles se echan de espaldas al océano tres veces en busca de purificación y celebración.

John the Baptist

Since June 24 falls on a Sunday this year, the Church

has the opportunity for a more intense celebration of the birth of John the Baptist, who is often described as the last of the Old Testament prophets and the bridge between Judaism and Christianity. More commonly, John is known as the "precursor" of our Lord Jesus Christ. All the Gospels report John's basic message: Repent, the kingdom is near at hand. One greater than I is coming.

Though he was a wandering preacher who dressed in camel skins and ate grasshoppers, John's legacy is one of true royalty. His origins are similar to those foretold by God through the prophet Isaiah: "You are my servant, he said to me, Israel through whom I show my glory" (Isaiah 49:3). John's humility—"I am not he"—was surpassed only by that of his Lord Jesus, the humble servant who followed.

Built With Humility

Today we celebrate the birth of John the Baptist. The Gospel recounts his naming, but besides distinguishing one person from another, what's in a name?

I knew a 2-year-old who, for a week or so, refused to answer to her given name. Instead, convinced she was Disney's famous mouse, she answered only to Mickey. It caused confusion when someone called out, "Hi! Julia," only to be ignored. But perhaps that

little one knew something about the importance of a name: It reflects who we are. Or in her case, who she thought she was

In the ancient Hebrew world, a name often indicated not only the identity of a person, but also their mission.

Today's first reading is one of the four Servant Songs found in Isaiah. The speaker declares that God called him from birth, giving both name — my servant, Israel — and the mission to witness God's glory with words strong and true as a sharp-edged sword. The servant was not only to restore the tribes of Jacob and survivors of Israel's exile; he was to be light to the nations so all people could know God's goodness.

While we might squirm at the designation of "servant," in Isaiah's time, to be the king's servant meant being particularly close to the ruler, the one who knew him well and who was entrusted with matters of great importance. To be the king's servant was an honor.

The psalmist echoes the servant's words, proclaiming that God intimately knows him, forming him in the womb. He gives thanks that he is wonderfully made.

We, too, are known and wonderfully made. "Not me," you might object. We aren't as handsome or beautiful as we'd like. When we compare ourselves to others, we don't measure up.

But what makes us wonderfully made isn't our looks, our IQ or the material goods we amass. It's the bit of God's self that has been knit into our bones. We have been given a name by God and a mission that grows out of it. We are made servants in Isaiah's sense of the word, entrusted with the sacred task of being God's love in the world.

That spark of divinity, planted in each of us, gives us our name and our mission.

In Acts, Paul quotes from 1 Samuel: "I have found David, son of Jesse, a man after my own heart." The Hebrew word used here for "heart" is lêbâb. It isn't simply the home of emotions, love and valentines. It's the center of everything. God's heart is God's being. When searching for the next king, God was looking for someone who could carry out the divine purpose and love with God's own heart.

John the Baptist had a unique part in carrying out that purpose. Gabriel announced the name to Zechariah before his son was conceived. It would be "John," meaning "God has shown favor." The messenger also revealed the child's call to go before the Lord and prepare the people to receive him.

John lived up to his name. After years in the desert listening and growing in the Spirit, he fearlessly witnessed to the greatest of God's favors: the coming of Jesus, the Servant-God. Jesus was not just close to God's heart. He was God's heart. And just as he shared it with the servant, with David and with John, he shares it with us.

That spark of divinity, planted in each of us, gives us our name and our mission.

Today, with our country and world torn by fear and division, we ask ourselves, "What can one person do?" Today's readings provide an answer. Listen deep within yourself and hear God speaking your name. Be faithful to it and be God's love in the world.

You may think that your efforts will be in vain. But like the servant in Isaiah, like John, place your trust in God, for it's God's love shared that transforms the world.
