



* Our budget for Fiscal 2017 was \$584,000, we surpassed our budgeted collections by \$7,400!








There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463; August, 510; September, 566; October, 621; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.

Treasures From Tradition

The American Revolution cleared the way for freedom of religion in the former colonies, since the colonies had always been a more religiously tolerant place than the old country. Even so, colonial laws restricted the practice of the Catholic faith, and just as in England, Americans who desired

to be priests or nuns had to go to the Netherlands or France. As political storm clouds gathered in France, an American woman, Mother Bernardina Matthews, the prioress of the Hoogstraeten Carmel in Holland, made a brave move. With two other American nuns, her nieces, and a Dutch sister, she came to Port Tobacco, Maryland, in 1790. Within twenty years the community had grown to twenty, although by 1823 their farm failed and they had to move to Baltimore and open a school. The Carmelite order requires contemplation and cloister, so in time the school was closed. The Port Tobacco land had long since been sold, but in 1976 a community of nuns was able to return thanks to loyal neighbors who had worked for forty years for their restoration. Today, our original American convent is fully alive in prayer, hard work, and strong community.

Desde el Concilio Vaticano II la Iglesia, como Pueblo de Dios, ha tomado la imagen de una peregrinación para definir su presencia en este mundo. Para los hispanos la peregrinación más antigua es la de Santiago de Compostela

en España cuya fiesta celebramos esta semana.

Según la tradición, Santiago Apóstol evangelizó España y después de su muerte su cadáver fue llevado a Galicia por acontecimientos milagrosos. En el siglo VII señales de estrellas llevaron al descubrimiento del lugar de su entierro y se construyó un santuario con el nombre de Campo de Estrellas. Eventualmente, a finales del primer milenio cristiano, empezaron las famosas peregrinaciones a Santiago.

Después de muchos siglos la mejor manera de llegar a Santiago todavía es a pie. Recorrer el camino de Santiago es caminar sobre las huellas de innumerables peregrinos que durante más de mil años han ido trazando el sendero. Peregrinar es caminar despacio por la vida de fe, aguantando lo que el camino ofrezca con la certeza final de gozar la contemplación de Dio.



Rest in the Lord

For several weeks we have listened to readings that have recounted just how arduous the work of prophets

and disciples can be. In today's Gospel, the Lord Jesus listens to the reports of those he had sent out "two by two" to minister to the people. After the apostles reported what they had done, Jesus, recognizing their fatigue, says, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest awhile" (Mark 6:31).



Perhaps this is what the Lord is telling his disciples in the year 2018 as well. We need to pause on our journey of discipleship and simply rest in the Lord. Sunday Mass provides many opportunities for quiet times, particularly during the periods of silence following the readings. Why not take the time today to allow the saving word of the Lord to penetrate your heart during those silent times? Ask the Lord to renew you in body, mind, and spirit for the arduous work of discipleship.

Meeting the Crowds

When I was in junior high, my religion teacher shared a story with me and my classmates. It was a fictionalized short story that started like this: "One night, Jesus and Peter were talking about the day's events over a couple of beers at the village pub."

As a 13-year-old, I was scandalized. It was very difficult to conjure up an image of Jesus being so, well, human. In my advanced years, I find this image to be more accessible and indeed, an image that I can easily retrieve in today's Gospel.

The final line in the Gospel might suggest that the focus should be on preparing for the miracle of the feeding of the 5,000. But this story can also be understood as a continuation of last week in which Jesus sends out the 12 apostles. They were sent out two by two to help carry out his mission of teaching and healing. Until now, the apostles had mainly been observers and crowd control. But, vested with a new authority, they went about the country driving out demons and anointing the sick.

We meet them in today's Gospel upon their return. We are not told what Jesus does while they are gone but we know he is there to welcome them back. This brings to mind the image of Jesus sitting with friends that my teacher allowed me so long ago. By all indications, it seems they have been successful and are now excitedly telling Jesus about all their experiences. I can picture him listening patiently and intently as they compete for his attention. Jesus recognizes the enthusiasm and anticipates what is surely to come for the apostles. He knows the magnitude of the responsibility of the power they now possess and the response of the people that will surely follow. Many times already, Jesus has been met with crowds. Jesus is right to assume this will also be the apostles' reality.

Jesus breaks up the party and invites the apostles to come away and rest awhile. This invitation should not surprise us. We know from the psalmist that this is what the Lord does. He gives us repose in verdant pastures or by restful waters so we can refresh our souls.

We, too, are sent out to teach and to heal and each of these responsibilities brings its own crowd which will no doubt find us.

But we sense that this invitation from Jesus might be more than suggesting a nap. We might even assume that it is a call for deep reflection for the apostles are now leaders and, as we are warned by Jeremiah, must be wary of leading the Lord's sheep astray. As Jesus has so often modeled for them, they must take the time to pray. And as is often the case in Mark, we see this play out almost immediately and are told that the people were already coming in such numbers that the poor apostles did not even have an opportunity to eat.

Each of us is called to carry out Jesus' mission in myriad ways: in our ministries, in the office, at school and in our families. We, too, are sent out to teach and to heal and each of these responsibilities brings its own crowd which will no doubt find us. This can also test our egos. On those good days when everything is working out just as we planned or other days where we can't seem to get anything right, we might begin to be tempted by the idea that we control it all.

We should make every effort to find a place to rest and to reflect so that we can be sure to remember who vested us with the power in the first place and whose mission we are carrying out. We should make every effort so that when we do go to meet the crowds we can meet them with the same compassion that Jesus did..
