Oscar Romero, the archbishop of San Salvador was was a human rights activist whose boldly opposed his country's military dictatorship. On March 24, 1980, Romero was assassinated inside his own church in a deliberate, cold-blooded murder that shocked the world.

Treasures From Tradition

Careful readers of the "Treasures" will have noticed that the two columns about the oldest monastic communities in the United States refer to the colonial states. The Louisiana Purchase gained a great treasure for our nation, the Ursuline monastery of New Orleans. Among the greatest pioneers of

that city were nuns who came from France on a perilous voyage in 1727, pestered by pirates and tossed by fearsome storms. These were genteel, well-educated Ursulines, yet their first task was to roll up their sleeves and open a hospital to care for the pestilence-ridden colony. Next, they opened a school for girls and launched a plan to educate the women being shipped over from France to marry settlers. In this way, they had enormous influence in molding patterns of family and domestic life.

At Christmastime in 1814, the threat of a British assault on the city was growing. On the terrifying night of January 7, 1815, the women of New Orleans gathered in the monastery chapel to pray that the city be spared from destruction in battle. The mother superior made a vow to have a Mass of Thanksgiving on that date every year should the Americans win. That night, Our Lady of Prompt Succor, to whom the nuns had great devotion, became the protector and patron of this great city. The convent in the French Quarter is the oldest standing building in the Mississippi valley, and the only surviving building of the French colonial period. The nuns relocated in 1824, but their old monastery is preserved as a museum and archives for the Archdiocese of New Orleans. The school the nuns began, Ursuline Academy, is the oldest continuously operating Catholic school, and school for women, in the United States. -Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



Strengthened By the Bread of Life

These days we would think primarily of Israel wandering in the desert, but faithful Jews would also have known the story of Elijah that we hear today. Strengthened by food and drink in the desert, the angel of the Lord sends him

Vida" del Evangelio según san Juan que comenzó hace dos semanas. Juan alude a los ancestros de los judíos que comieron el maná en el desierto. Hoy pensaríamos sobre todo en el pueblo de Israel caminando por el desierto, pero los judíos fieles también conocían el relato de Elías que escuchamos hoy. Elías comió y bebió en el desierto, y con la fuerza de aquel alimento,

el ángel del Señor lo envió en su viaje de cuarenta días y cuarenta noches (la cifra bíblica que simboliza un tiempo de preparación). De la misma manera que el alimento que recibió Elías en el desierto, Jesús le dice a su público que él es pan para la vida del mundo. Es muy importante que sigamos escuchando a Jesús después de su promesa de vida eterna, sin duda es una promesa maravillosa, pero esta "recompensa" no es la única razón para darnos un festín con el Pan de Vida. También vamos a la mesa con el fin de recibir fuerzas para el camino de la misión, de manera que el mundo entero pueda tener vida en la plenitud de Cristo. Si hemos comido el pan de vida, estamos obligados a servir a todos.

Bread for the Living and the Living Bread

Have you ever had one of those mornings where you were running a little behind schedule to get to work or school and you just grabbed a piece of toast or maybe skipped breakfast all-together? Then — well before lunch time, your stomach probably reminded you of the consequences of that decision. You noticed your energy level was drooping; it was hard to concentrate, to be productive, to complete the tasks at hand.

If you are blessed enough to know where your next meal is coming from, then your thoughts likely turned to those for whom real hunger is a constant threat to life. You might have pictured school children struggling in poverty, refugees in tent cities, or subsistence farmers around the world. In such moments of awareness, we are mindful of how essential physical nourishment is to sustaining basic survival and the activities that we think of as "life."

As our body requires physical food, our spiritual life also needs nourishment if we are to fulfill the commands to love God and neighbor. In today's Gospel, we hear the wondrous pronouncement that God the Father provides that spiritual sustenance in Jesus, "the bread of life." The Father draws us to Jesus that we may believe in him, follow his way during this life, and through him receive eternal life. With infinite grace and mercy, God offers us the invitation to eternal life and gifts us with the means to respond.

Today's Gospel is preceded by the story of Elijah's flight into the desert. The first reading highlights how God provides for us so that we are able respond to his call. We hear of the prophet's journey to Horeb, "the mountain of God." Elijah has been dealing with a whirlwind of political and religious turmoil, he is despondent and exhausted. Instead of forging ahead, Elijah sags to the ground and tells God he is going to give up rather than pressing on to the mountain. God sends an angel to deliver food and water and to not-so-gently order Elijah to eat and drink because he has a divine appointment to keep. Elijah was obedient and continued on to Horeb. Once there, Elijah

profoundly experienced God's presence and received instructions to anoint new leaders and call a new prophet, Elisha, as his successor. God's provision for Elijah spared his life and empowered him to accomplish his God-given tasks on behalf of the Israelites.

In much the same way as God provided for Elijah, God supplied manna to the Israelites to sustain them on their Exodus journey to the promised land. In today's Gospel, Jesus is speaking to the crowd who are following him, in part, because they have witnessed the miracle of the loaves and fish. He reminds them

that on the Exodus journey their "ancestors ate the manna in the desert" but they died because that was just physical food. Jesus goes on to tell the crowd that what they were experiencing in his presence was more than just the physical food they received in the miracle. God was providing for them in Jesus, "the living bread," that was able to sustain them on their spiritual journey and give them eternal life.

In today's Gospel, we hear God's invitation for us to partake of "the bread that comes down from heaven" and to be nourished on our spiritual journey. We are thankful first, of course, for the Eucharist where we receive Christ's body and blood in communion with all the faithful around the globe. And we are mindful of Jesus' presence in the sacraments celebrated in our community life. Then, in much the same way as we are grateful for a meal and pause to remember those who hunger, here, too, we recall those who are in need. Even as we receive "the bread of life," we remember that it is not given for our life alone. In and through Jesus, God nourishes us to continue his mission, loving and serving all of our brothers and sisters.
