There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566; October, 621; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.

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
Oscar Romero - Save the Dates




Lector Workbooks Available



Treasures From Tradition

From its earliest days, the Church has had an interest in the education of young people. In ancient Rome, teachers of boys had to resign their posts in order to become catechumens, since the education of boys was so keyed to the lore and worship of the gods. In other ages, public education has been so attuned to other values that creative solutions have arisen.

In late eighteenth- and early nineteenthcentury Ireland, government schools had a goal of "Anglicizing" the Irish in culture and religion. Most Irish Catholics opted out in favor of "hedge schools." In these largely secret schools, meeting not just in the shadow of hedges but also in cottages and barns throughout Ireland, schoolmasters provided eager students with a classical education grounded in Greek and Latin, Irish literature, the banned Gaelic language, and the catechism of the Church. The so-called penal laws forbade Catholics from teaching young people publicly or privately, and "civil disobedience" ruled the day. In 1826, a British government study showed that of half a million Irish children enrolled in schools, 403,000 were in hedge schools! A woman named Nano Nagle defied the law by opening schools for the poor. Eventually her companions became the Presentation Sisters. A layman named Edmund Rice, inspired by her courage, founded the Irish Christian Brothers for the same purpose. By 1820, the situation eased, since Irish Catholics had shown that they would defy any law that diminished their love of learning and threatened their

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

En 1648 el franciscano Matías Abad llegó a la selva chocoana en la costa pacífica de Colombia. Allí, a pesar de los ataques indígenas en contra de los misioneros, pudo celebrar la fiesta de san Francisco (4 de octubre). Al pasar de los años la devoción a san Francisco en Chocó se convirtió en una mezcla de la fe

> católica, las religiones africanas y la brujería. Este sincretismo es una forma de superstición que busca utilizar al santo en lugar de imitarlo.

Esta confianza en imágenes y estatuas es común y hasta peligrosa entre los latinoamericanos. Las hazañas de ciertas imágenes milagrosas llegan a proporciones exageradas. Por ejemplo, la imagen de "san Pachito", como lo llaman los chocoanos, se le atribuye haber apagado un incendio que amenazaba la población. La pusieron delante de las llamas y las apagó con su propio sudor.

Hay que tener cuidado con la importancia de las imágenes sagradas de nuestras tradiciones. En un descuido pueden convertirse en ídolos o amuletos en lugar del recuerdo de la presencia divina y el desafío de vivir en santidad.

Not Against Us

Like Moses before him, Jesus corrects his disciples' misunderstanding of the gift of the Spirit. They saw people who were not of their company casting out demons and doing other works such as Jesus had done. Jesus points out that no one who does a good deed in his name can be opposed to him at the same time. He goes on to point out the importance of the "little ones,": the poor, simple people, children, the meek ones who are not important in the world. It is to them that he was sent, not to the wealthy and the self-righteous. He underscores the importance of small works done in faith, as well as big

works like driving out demons. "Anyone who gives you a cup of water . . . because you belong to Christ . . . will surely not lose his reward" (Mark 9:41). God builds the coming reign little by little in our actions, however small and unassuming, when they are done out of love of God and neighbor.

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¿Quién Está a Nuestro Favor?

Jesús, como Moisés que estuvo antes que él, corrige los malentendidos de los discípulos sobre el don del Espíritu. Vieron a personas, que no eran parte de su grupo, echar demonios y hacer otros milagros como Jesús había hecho. Jesús señala que nadie que hace milagros en su nombre puede luego hablar mal de él. Luego señala la importancia de la "gente sencilla": los pobres, las personas sencillas, los niños, los humildes que no son importantes en el mundo. Es a ellos a quienes fue enviado, no a los ricos ni a los farisaicos. Jesús hace hincapié en la importancia de las pequeñas obras hechas con fe, de la misma manera

que las grandes obras como echar a los demonios. "Todo aquél que les dé a beber un vaso de agua...por el hecho de que son de Cristo...les aseguro que no se quedará sin recompensa" (Marcos 9:41). Dios construye el Reino por venir poco a poco con nuestras acciones, sin importar que sean pequeñas o sencillas, si se las hace por amor a Dios y al prójimo.

"Do Not Prevent Them"

"At that time, John said to Jesus, 'Teacher, we saw someone driving out demons in your name, and we tried to prevent him because he does not follow us.""

Today, we could possibly hear, "Father, we saw someone praying over a sick parishioner, and we tried to stop her because she is not Catholic."

"Jesus replied, 'Do not prevent them. There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me. For whoever is not against us is for us.""

Or we could even hear, "Bishop, we saw a Catholic laying hands on a sick person, and we tried to stop him because he was not a priest."

"Jesus replied, 'Do not prevent them. There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me. For whoever is not against us is for us."

Sometimes, we are uncomfortable when we see a person, who is not a Catholic or a priest, doing something that we expect only priests to do. It seems that the apostles were just as uncomfortable with a non-believer driving out demons in the name of Jesus.

Jesus sees the issue differently. Jesus gives room for the non-believer to act as he did out of compassion for another.

There is a parallel situation recounted in the first reading. At the command of the Lord, Moses gathered 70 men. The Lord came down in the cloud and bestowed on these men some of the spirit he had given to Moses. At that, the men prophesied in the name of the Lord.

Now, two men had left the camp and were not there when the Lord came and bestowed his spirit. Nevertheless, later, these two men were prophesying in the name of the Lord. Joshua, Moses' aide, got upset and wanted Moses to stop the two. Moses said, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the Lord were prophets! Would that the Lord might bestow his spirit on them all!" Moses gives room for the non-inducted to carry out ministry in God's name because of a personal interior calling.

We must take care that we, too, do not exclude God's working through people who are not of our number or who don't meet our expectations or beliefs. What was driving the complaint of the disciples and Joshua against those who were ministering based on a personal interior call? On the face of it, it seems like jealousy. Sort of: "We thought that we were the only ones appointed to do these works." In the case of the disciples, it goes even deeper. They had not been able to drive a demon out themselves ... and here was an outsider doing it! And, not much before this, the disciples had been caught in a discussion of who among them was the

greatest. Jesus would have none of it: "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all" (Mark 9:35). They were challenged by Jesus.

Joshua and the disciples had not gotten the point that bringing the message and healing of God was the job of everyone. They were not the sole dispensers of God's blessings.

We must take care that we, too, do not exclude God's working through people who are not of our number or who don't meet our expectations or beliefs. We could easily end up like Joshua and the disciples, trying to limit the work and blessings of God in the world.

Looking at it from another side, is it possible that some people do not do what they are called to do because they think that all ministry belongs to someone else, to someone who is ordained or officially credentialed. It just might be that they are God's person-on-the-spot to minister to someone — no matter how others may see it.
