There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566/563; October, 628; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.



Treasures From Tradition

One of our great treasures is the way the Church has frequently flourished under unfavorable conditions, like the grape ivy on the mantel that refuses to die no matter how infrequently you water it or open the drapes. Like the apartheid laws in South Africa in the last century, the penal laws of Ireland were aimed

at depriving the majority population of basic human rights. The Protestant parliament of Ireland enacted laws limiting the practice of Catholicism. The goal was to force conversion from "popery" to the Church of Ireland, and additional laws took aim at Jews, non-Anglicans, and Quakers.

There were laws against intermarriage, laws against Catholics being lawyers (there was a one-hundred-pound fine), a law granting lifelong income to priests who became Protestant, and a ban on weapons. In fact, until 1793, a Catholic man had to recruit and pay a Protestant man to serve in the local militia in his place! As if family life is not complicated enough in any age, the sons of a deceased father could divide his land equally, unless one became Protestant. In that case all would go to him! When allowed, new Catholic churches had to be built of wood, not stone, be off a main road or city square, have no steeple or bell, and be called a "chapel." Catholic "Emancipation" was largely secured by 1829, but even up to the founding of the Irish State in the 1920s, some effects of the laws endured. No wonder that poor Irish immigrants to the United States frequently built gloriously beautiful churches as their first act on free soil!

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Un viejo chiste relata que una ancianita por más que se apresuraba a llegar al templo, siempre llegaba tarde al rosario. Un día decidió adelantarse para ver por qué duraba tan poco tiempo el rezo del rosario. A la hora establecida salió un ministro de la sacristía y velozmente recitó "Cruz, Bola, bolita, bolita, bolita,

Bola . . .".

Esta es una exageración del hecho que muchos rezan el rosario como si fuera una serie de fórmulas que se repiten sin pensar. Esta devoción mariana debe meditarse con tranquilidad y en silencio. El enfoque del rezo del rosario son los misterios de la vida de Jesús. Los "Padrenuestros" y las "Ave Marías" nos ayudan a entrar en esa meditación en una forma mas profunda. Esas oraciones deben ayudarnos a penetrar el misterio de un acontecimiento gozoso, luminoso, doloroso, o glorioso de la vida de Jesucristo. Pero, una vez

que estamos en presencia del misterio, debemos enfocarnos y contemplar a Dios. Esto no significa que el rosario no deba nunca rezarse en voz alta y en grupo. El rosario también tiene su dimensión comunitaria, pero ésta necesita fundarse en una verdadera meditación. En varias culturas latinoamericanas aún se canta el rosario. Ya sea a solas o en comunidad, rezado o cantado, el rosario es un tesoro de nuestra fe que nos puede facilitar la contemplación del salvador.



Reflection

Embrace the Mess

Most couples walk down the aisle on their wedding day filled with the promise of love. They are bound together by their dreams of a mutually life-giving relationship. They are united in trusting their future together. Today's Gospel reading begins with a painful description of what happens when love is wounded beyond healing; when bonds are fragmented beyond repair; and when trust is shattered beyond hope. The divorce of someone close to us can leave us feeling disillusioned

and helpless. However, the way Jesus welcomed the little children immediately after being tested by the Pharisees points to how he wants us to support those going through the heartache of divorce, or for that matter, any other difficult and complicated experience.

Although artists like to paint a picture of Jesus sitting nobly on a rock surrounded by serene children gazing attentively at him, those of us who know real-life children doubt the genuineness of this artwork. What are the odds of a baby filling his diaper just as he is being handed to Jesus? Can't you imagine a toddler screeching and clinging to her mother in stranger-danger fear? How long do you think two siblings stood around before they began tussling with each other? Jesus did not tell the parents to clean up their act or scold the children for their youthful energy. Rather, he welcomed the mess with an open heart, and scolded the disciples for trying to avoid it. So, first of all, Jesus calls us to faithfully and courageously wade into the mess with those who are struggling, so they do not have to face it alone.

Life for children in the first century was precarious and servile. Under Roman law, they did not have rights and were often regarded on the same level as property. Perhaps, that is why the disciples were ushering the children away. They felt Jesus had more important things to do than to waste his time on children. Others would have perceived Jesus risking his honor by this undignified behavior. Instead, Jesus turned common perceptions upside down by embracing those that society did not value. Jesus tells us that by serving children, we serve God. If we are following Jesus' lead, we will

When hearts are broken and dreams are shattered, Jesus calls us to welcome the mess, embrace the pain, and patiently wait for new blessings to emerge. encircle those who are feeling vulnerable and marginalized with the same tender care.

Children at play often mirror the behavior they have observed from their parents and other significant adults. Many a parent has been either embarrassed or charmed when they have heard their own words coming out of their child's mouth; when a child mimics their quirky gesture; or when a child insists on doing something exactly the way a parent does it. How do you think

the children emulated Jesus blessing them? What do you think they saw reflected in his presence? What did they learn about themselves through their relationship with Jesus? God created us to be in relationship so we could mirror God's presence to each other. When love's mirror has been distorted, those who are hurting especially need someone to reflect God's love clearly. Jesus wants us to bless each other by being his listening, patient and compassionate presence. Would we be embarrassed or charmed by how children might imitate us?

The Pharisees in today's Gospel tried to trip Jesus up with their laws. Even as Jesus sparred with their legalism, he modeled a different way of being in relationship. He welcomed the bedlam and commotion of children, embraced their humble, seemingly insignificant lives, and lifted them up in blessing. When hearts are broken and dreams are shattered, Jesus calls us to welcome the mess, embrace the pain, and patiently wait for new blessings to emerge. Left with the image of Jesus willingly being tackled by a throng of kids, we can ask ourselves, "How good are we at welcoming, embracing and blessing the messiness of life?".
