There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566/563; October, 628; November 622.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.

Treasures From Tradition

One of our great treasures is the way the Church has freqThey say that it is not so much that Columbus discovered America, but rather that after he arrived, the new world "stayed discovered." The sponsorship of Ferdinand and Isabella assured that the news would flash around Europe with an air of authority that other

"discoverers" lacked. One of the oft-mentioned early visitors is Saint Brendan the Navigator, a sixth-century Irish monk who had trouble staying at home. He is said to have sailed to "the Isle of the Blessed" in a leather-bound boat, and to have been away from his monastery for seven years. Upon his return, the stories of adventures to a new land attracted pilgrims to his monastery in the Blasket Islands, off the west coast of Ireland. Columbus is said to have referred to The Voyage of Saint Brendan, a very popular adventure in those days. Only after his American journey is Brendan said to have gone to tamer lands to the east, England and Scotland.

In 1976, Tim Severin set out on a two-year voyage to America from Ireland in a leather-bound boat, traveling in summer and hopscotching from the Faroes to Iceland to Newfoundland, and encountering along the way exactly what Saint Brendan describes: icebergs, whales, and porpoises. Scholars warn not to dismiss this too quickly: just as the ancient Egyptian monks sought to live in the desert, for the Celtic monks exile in a boat was the Irish equivalent. Five centuries after Brendan, other Irish monks may have visited here as a refuge from Viking terror.

la imagen se reveló como milagrosa para los que oraban delante de ella.

En la imagen aparece Jesús crucificado. Sobre él está el Espíritu Santo y el Padre. A la derecha de la cruz está su Madre con el corazón traspasado por una lanza y a su derecha, el fiel discípulo amado. Esta imagen es venerada como el Señor de los Milagros. Sin saberlo el artista angoleño ha pintado una reflexión teológica sobre la divinidad y la humanidad de Jesucristo. En su pasión redentora Jesús abre las puertas del cielo y de la

comunicación entre el cielo y la tierra, entre Dios y la humanidad representada por la Madre y el discípulo.

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Words of Wisdom

The spirit of wisdom, as we discover in today's first reading, comes to those who pray for her. Wisdom, like the word of God, carries a message of consolation as well as of great challenge. The Letter to the Hebrews tells us that the word of God, infused with the wisdom of God, is "sharper than any two-edged sword." We cannot shrink from the wisdom of God, or from the word that has the power to penetrate our hearts and minds. Jesus, the living word of God, the embodiment of wisdom, has strong, deeply penetrating words for the rich young man who comes to him seeking answers to his

most profound questions. Just when the young man thought he had done enough to fulfill God's commands, more was asked of him. This is no less true for us.

Threading the Needle

At a Napa Valley winery in California, there stands a life-sized statue of a camel contemplating an enormously oversized needle. Even though the needle is so scaled up that the camel has to stretch to see through its eye, the eye is still much too small for the camel to even stick its head through. Yet if the camel's resolute expression is any indication, it's convinced it will eventually find a way.

This piece of artwork naturally calls to mind today's Gospel reading in which

Jesus tells his disciples it is easier for a camel to fit through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. It seems an odd choice for a winery frequented by its many wealthy patrons. Aren't they disturbed by the apparent reminder that their passage into heaven would be impossibly small even if it were hundreds of times wider?

But why should I expect them to be alarmed? Churchgoers hear this Gospel over and over again without being compelled to sell our possessions. Like the camel statue, even when the evidence to the contrary stares us in the face, we still believe we can find a way through without really changing.

In homilies and reflection groups, I have always been given abundant excuses to hold on to my possessions, rarely hearing anyone argue that Jesus meant what he said literally. People bring up alternate translations, Jesus' penchant for hyperbole, or his assurance that all things are possible with God. Others suggest that it is simply necessary to be detached from worldly goods, not to actually give them up. Some even hedge by pointing out that Jesus' advice might not be universally applicable.

But if we look at the Gospel and today's other readings, the question becomes not, "Can we hold onto our possessions and still get into heaven?" but, "Why would we want to hang on to our possessions?"

The young man who leaves (to return to his riches, we assume) is the only sad person in any of today's readings. Others are enriched, joyful or astonished and impressed by God's ways.

The question becomes not, "Can we hold onto our possessions and still get into heaven?" but, "Why would we want to hang on to our possessions?" The first reading tells us that the spirit of wisdom is preferable to riches, health, beauty and light and is the source of all good things. Meanwhile, the psalmist sings for joy at God's love and kindness, even celebrating past suffering because of its resulting reunion with God.

In the reading from Hebrews, Paul tells us that the word of God is "living and effective ... penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections

and thoughts of the heart." Are any of our possessions that powerful? Do they know us so intimately as the word of God?

Finally, Jesus tells us that the way to gain eternal life and treasure in heaven is to give up what we have for his sake and the sake of the Gospel.

It is certainly legitimate to consider the background of Jesus' call to renounce possessions or to take other responsibilities into account when discerning what and how to give. But, we should also consider that Jesus meant what he said and knew what he was talking about when he said that riches keep us apart from God. Having more than we need can be a sign that we haven't loved our suffering neighbors enough to use our gifts to help them. The pursuit and enjoyment of material comfort can obscure our dependence on God or distract us from following God's will.

While we are assured that there is still hope when we fall short — with God all things are possible, Jesus reminds us — that is no reason to ignore Jesus' call. When we make excuses for hanging onto wealth, it not only deprives us of the opportunity to serve others who might benefit from what we could give, but also robs us of the opportunity to pursue what is really valuable: wisdom, prudence, God's love and presence and eternal life in the kingdom of God.
