

Your gifts will benefit those who come to our food pantry. Instructions and materials are provided in the kit, and donations should be returned no later than Sunday, January 6th.

Ministry of Care

Tax Credit Scholarships

Are you interested in supporting low income students with your tax dollars? A 75% state tax credit is available for donations toward a qualified scholarship granting organization (SGO). St. Teresa of Avila has partnered with St. Benedict the African, one of just two schools still servicing Chicago's Englewood neighborhood, to encourage funding scholarships through the new Illinois tax credit scholarship program.

This program is a great way to maximize your charitable dollars. For example, a net contribution of \$1,045 (\$4180 donation with a \$3,135 tax credit) you can support a full scholarship.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628 people at weekend Masses.

The 2017/2018 monthly averages are: January 489/644; Februrary, 570/566; March, 640/637; April, 705/810; May, 573/583; June, 541/523; July, 463/511; August, 510/509; September, 566/563; October, 628/652; November 622/569.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ration of 1:7094 Catholics.



Treasures From Tradition

Look around most Catholic churches, and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth, and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for

Jesus, for Mary, and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation.

Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing.

En 1726, Juan de la Cruz (1542-1591) fue canonizado por el Papa Benito XIII. Nació en la región de Castilla en España, este doctor de la Iglesia junto con Teresa de Ávila fue reformador de la Orden Carmelita. Muchas órdenes religiosas del siglo XV sufrieron grandes decadencias. Por eso mientras los protestantes

se separaban de la Iglesia, los religiosos descalzos, recoletos y observantes buscaban reformar órdenes religiosas, como la Orden de la Bienaventurada Virgen María del Monte Carmelo, uniéndose siempre más a la Iglesia romana.

Para los reformadores católicos quedarse en la Iglesia no fue fácil, ¡sin embargo se quedaron! Aunque sus reformas fueron apoyadas por los Papas, muchos de ellos como Juan de la Cruz tuvieron que aguantar muchas oposiciones y persecuciones para lograr sus reformas. Estas reformas ardían con el deseo de amar bien a Cristo

Jesús y a su cuerpo que es la Iglesia.

En sus poesías, Juan de la Cruz muestra la fuerza de esta llama de amor vivo a pesar de la oscuridad de la noche que no lo deja encontrar al amante (Dios).

Awaiting the Salvation of God

A la Espera de la Salvación de Dios

The world does not seem big enough to contain the jubilation of the first reading. In the Gospel reading, the Roman empire isn't big enough, either. The great powers of Rome are named and made to stand waiting for the arrival of God's salvation. And we find Paul meditating joyfully on what really matters.

According to Baruch, the city of Jerusalem is like a person standing on tiptoe looking for God's salvation, which is coming from the east. Those who were led away on foot, heads down, now come back, a proud people. Why, the very way is smoothed out. The path is lined with fragrant, lush trees.

It can't get any better than this, can it? Well, ves, it can. For a voice calls out in the desert. Here is the beginning of the salvation of God.

Metanoia

Advent is not primarily a time to get ready for Christmas (that might be news to the marketers!) or for celebrating Jesus' birth 2,000 years ago. It is a time to deepen our participation in the presence of the divine being born into the world right now.

Today's readings offer hope — hope grounded in the history of God with the people and hope for a way forward in difficult times.

In the first reading, we see
Jerusalem as a mother, mourning the
loss of her children who have been exiled to Babylon. We
understand the sorrow of a mother who waits, powerless to
relieve the suffering of her children so far away. Photos of
immigrant mothers whose chil-dren were taken from them
at the U.S.-Mexico border give us a modern image of this
agony.

Yet this reading is one of hope. The prophet announces the exile is coming to an end. The cloak of God's shining presence replaces the mother's sackcloth. She waits on the mountaintop to see her children making their way home from east and west. God hasn't forgotten them.

No. They will return as royalty along rough roads made smooth. God is leading them, not because they were good at keeping rules. They were not. But because God is faithful and full of mercy.

The Gospel uses similar words of straightening roads to introduce the mission of John the Baptist. But first, Luke makes sure we know that John's call came in the midst of messy human history. He names the political "Who's Who," starting at the top with Tiberius Caesar then Pontius Pilate, Herod Antipas and his brother, sons of Herod the Great. The high priests Annas and Caiaphas are included in the list. Politics right down to religious leaders. Both John and Jesus would suffer at their hands.

The powerful and wealthy were not friends of the poor and marginalized then just as they are not now. We wait in a messy world ruled by power and money. Not a lot has changed ... that is, on the outside.

But real change happens on the inside. Hope resides in

This inner change is not about personal salvation. It is for all people. All creation.

the heart.

When John the Baptist called for repentance, he was not telling people to be sorry for breaking rules. The Greek word translated here as "repentance" is metanoia, and its biblical sense is broad and deep. It is a turning, an inner transformation, a radical change in lifestyle. (The verses following today's Gospel give good examples.)

Isaiah's words describe John as a voice crying out from the margins. The desert was not exactly where people

hung out. His message was to prepare the way for God's coming by filling in the valleys and leveling the mountains. But not on the outside. It is the geogra-phy of the heart he calls us to change. Clear the path to welcome Christ who is born into our hearts as truly as Jesus was born in Bethlehem.

This inner change is not about personal salvation. It is for all people. All creation. Luke makes sure we know that, too. Jesus was not born to make a "holy family" with Mary and Joseph, or even to make his hometown of Nazareth a better place (though surely he did). Fol-lowing Jesus is a community thing.

Paul's letter testifies to that. His affection for the community at Philippi is obvious. The word used for his longing referred to heart, lungs and liver: the inner organs. Paul loved them with his gut. He knew he did not labor alone. He was part of a growing community, supporting one another, trying to live as Jesus did, and giving witness to the risen Christ.

We are called to do the same: to live with the tender love and mercy that God showed to the Israelites; and to be people of justice, called to inner transformation so we can participate in Christ's ongoing transformation of the world.
