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A Steward's Story

Lent is a time for "prayer, fasting, and almsgiving." Lent is a time for "giving things up." Lent is a time for "taking things up."

These are common things to hear in Catholic circles in weeks leading up to Lent. While sometimes this can lead to comparisons, judgment, or envy, we should still count it a blessing that our personal spiritual practices become a public topic of conversation in our community, if only for a couple weeks. What an opportunity to truly engage in the lives of our brothers and sister in Christ.

What we don't always talk about, though, is the conversations that happen on the other side of Lent.

- "How many weeks did you make it?"
- "Did you make it all the way through?"
- "Eating chocolate on Sundays is cheating?"

Catholic Fun Fact: Sundays are not part of Lent. Sunday is always the Lord's day as a celebration of the sacrifice that exists for the past, present, and future. Go ahead, count the days in Lent, you need to omit the Sundays if you want to find 40 days. This means that it is actually okay to "partake" in our lenten fasts on Sundays. If you are anything like me, the first time you heard this, you may have thought "that's cheating! If you quit on Sundays, your Lent doesn't count!" I know I took pride in making it farther than a sibling or a friend in my lenten sacrifice.

This year, I was reflecting on that if we took this attitude into our Lenten experience, while we may be giving up chocolate or greed or anger, we write an open invitation for pride. Lent is an opportunity to *be with* Jesus in the desert. Not to *be* Jesus. It is okay if we are weak and stumble or even fall in our Lenten practices. The victory is not in finishing the race without a misstep. The victory is in having run the race, maybe battered and bruised, maybe even taking a taxi part of the way. Spending time with Jesus is a victory regardless of how long.

Just like the poor widow, if all we have to give in our Lent is our two coins of personal sacrifice, if those were more challenging than the riches of those for whom Lent comes easy, we, still in our spiritual poverty, we have given all that we have, and God is grateful.

There are 351 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago; only 55 parishes have weekend attendance that exceeds 2,000. St. Teresa's October Count averaged for 2016, 550; for 2017, 628; for 2018, 652 people at weekend Masses.

The 2018/2019 monthly averages are: January 644/623; Februrary, 566; March, 637; April, 810; May, 583; June, 523; July, 511; August, 509; September, 563; October, 652; November 569; December 576.

In the Archdiocese there is 1 priest for every 1525 parishioners; in the USA the ratio is 1:1653 Catholics; 27 percent of US parishes do not have a resident priest. In comparison, South America has a ratio of 1:7094 Catholics.



Treasures From Tradition

Often, when a family keeps vigil around a person who is preparing for death, they may notice three interwoven activities. First, the dying person may become more prayerful and reflective than ever before, reviewing life's journey in gratitude to God, or seeking forgiveness and making amends for wrongs. Second, as death approaches, the need to eat and drink is lessened until even an ice

need to eat and drink is lessened until even an ice cube brushed against the lips is satisfying. Third, persons who are dying often make plans to give their possessions away, making bequests, handing treasures down, providing for favorite charities.

Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving: with these three "pillars" of Lent, we rehearse our death every year in this season, and anticipate the final work we will do in this life. And every year, at the end of our journey, is the joy of Easter and the experience of the victory of Christ over death's darkness and power. Annually, we remind ourselves that the Christian experiences the same power and presence at the end of life's journey: Christ to the rescue and the lasting joy of heaven.

Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe

Las cenizas y esas frases dan un mensaje que lleva la imagen de la tierra que se somete para cultivarse. A veces la tierra se quema para que de sus cenizas venga vida nueva. Las cenizas que se nos pusieron no son para despreciar nuestra vida sino para amarla. De esa manera seremos cultivados

por el ayuno, la oración y la caridad que hagamos durante la cuaresma, sometiendo el polvo de nuestro cuerpo para dar fruto eterno.

Almsgiving, Prayer, Fasting, and Temptation

As we begin our season of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, the reading from Deuteronomy reminds us of our duty of almsgiving, that we "set [our offerings] before the Lord, [our] God, [and] shall bow down in [God's] presence" (Deuteronomy 26:10). The reading from Romans refers us to our prayer, reminding us that "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart . . . For everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved" (Romans 10:8, 13). These are comforting words, and encourage us to ask God for what we need and to aid us in our prayer. Finally, the Gospel of Luke shows us a fasting

Jesus, who was tempted as we are, and who knows what it means to be human. Someone once said that temptation arises when you're tired and weary, and the devil comes along and makes a perfectly reasonable suggestion. Jesus shows us that, with his help, we too can overcome our temptations, reasonable as they may sound.

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Oración, Limosna, Ayuno y Tentación

A medida que empezamos nuestro tiempo de oración, limosna y ayuno, la lectura del libro del Deuteronomio nos recuerda nuestro deber de ofrecer: "Deiarás los frutos en la presencia del Señor tu Dios, te postrarás ante él" (Deuteronomio 26:10). La lectura de la carta a los romanos nos refiere a nuestra oración, recordándonos que "La palabra está cerca de ti, en tu boca y en tu corazón . . . todo el que invoque el nombre del Señor se salvará" (Romanos 10:8, 13). Estas palabras son reconfortantes, y nos animan a pedir a Dios aquello que necesitamos y nos ayuda en nuestra oración. Por último, el Evangelio de Lucas nos muestra a Jesús ayunando,

siendo tentado así como lo somos nosotros y además él entiendo lo que significa ser humano. Alguien una vez dijo que la tentación surge cuando se está cansado y rendido; y el mal viene y hace una sugerencia perfectamente razonable. Jesús no muestra que, con su ayuda, nosotros también podemos vencer nuestras tentaciones, tan razonable como pueda sonar.

Great Temptations

In 1989, Henri Nouwen, a Catholic priest and one of the most beloved spiritual writers of the 20th century published a short yet powerful volume, In the Name of Jesus: Reflections on Christian Leadership. This text is Nouwen's concomitant reflection on two Gospel passages: the story of Jesus' temptation in the desert, specifically Matthew 4: 1-10, and the story of Peter's call to shepherd Jesus' flock found in John 21:15-19.

It is only a matter of time; temptations return again and again needling us where we are weakest in our resolve to live fully our call as Christians.

While the name of the text might find many checking the text off the reading list before even adding it because of the subtitle, Reflections on Christian Leadership, I would encourage you not to let that deter you. As disciples of Christ, we all lead others in various ways and there is much to be gained from Nouwen's thoughts. Nouwen breaks open each temptation in light of a shift in attitude, or what I prefer to call posture of presence and a particular practice or discipline which facilitates that shift.

Let's look again at the temptations. Jesus is taunted to be relevant: Turn these stones into bread! Jesus is taunted again to be spectacular: Worship me and I will give you all this power and glory! Jesus is goaded once more to be powerful: Throw yourself off this parapet and save yourself! With each needling provocation, Jesus lets his tempter know that he stands firmly in God.

Calling on the wisdom in the passage from the Gospel of John, Nouwen demands that we move away from the temptation of relevancy to a posture of prayer; from the temptation to be spectacular or popular to a posture of service and right relationship; and from the temptation to be powerful, being in the forefront, to reflecting and being led by those in need. Each is a very tall order indeed.

I wonder if in this season of Lent, we might choose just one temptation, one provocation which needles us and focus our energies there — to shift our posture just a bit. This being the first week of Lent, I plan to start with a shift in my posture from relevancy to prayer. During Lent, the church calls us to deepen our spiritual life by engaging the practices of prayer, almsgiving and fasting. Why else might I start

here? Perhaps because the last verse of the passage from Luke is a wake-up call.

There are three scriptural accounts of the temptation of Jesus in the desert. The accounts from the Gospels of Matthew and Mark end with the angels coming to support Jesus after the third temptation. But this account, the one from the Gospel of Luke which we read today ends, "When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time." He departed from him for a

time? For a time? What does that mean?

We all know from experience that temptations to be less than or to be more of what we are not called to be as Christians, stares us in the face more often than we would like: Take credit for the success even though there was a team who did most of the work. Accept the promotion which should have been offered to another person in the department. Make a decision which impacts those in our care negatively because of our foolish pride. It is only a matter of time; temptations return again and again needling us where we are weakest in our resolve to live fully our call as Christians.

Whether it is the temptation toward relevancy, popularity or power, any resolve I have to combat these is grace and is founded in my relationship with God; it is founded in prayer. And how blessed I am — how blessed we are — that when facing any temptation to be less than who we are called to be as Christians, we might call out in prayer with the beautiful rejoinder provided as today's psalm response: "Be with me, Lord, when I am in trouble."
